The City Government of General Santos, through the Youth Affairs and Development Office and the Asia-Pacific Youth Exchange and Urban Youth Academy, will be conducting the 2017 National Young Leaders' Conference on Sustainable Development on May 20-23, 2017 in General Santos City.

The conference serves as a venue for youth participants and future leaders to undergo leadership training and policy formulation simulation.

In view of the above, and upon the request of Mayor Ronnel C. Rivera, Local Chief Executives are encouraged to allow the members of the Task Force on Youth Development, the Local Youth Development Council and sanggunian members who are thirty years old and below at the time of their election, to attend the said conference, on official business.

The payment of applicable traveling expenses, and hotel accommodation, may be authorized in accordance with, and subject to applicable limitations prescribed in COA Circular No. 2012-003 dated October 29, 2012, chargeable against available local funds and to the usual accounting and auditing requirements and to all pertinent laws, rules and regulations.

Mayor Rivera, through the Youth Affairs and Development Office, General Santos City, shall submit a Post-Activity Report to the Secretary of Interior and Local Government, through the Director of the Bureau of Local Government Supervision, within fifteen (15) days after the conduct of the said activity, with the following prescribed format:






2017 National Young Leaders' Conference on Sustainable Development, organized by the City Government of General Santos (GenSan), through its City Youth Affairs and Development Office, and In partnership with Asia-Pacific Youth Exchange and Urban Youth Academy, aims to make the SDG campaign more localized and for youth leaders – especially those at the grassroots – to acquire the necessary knowledge and enhance the skills needed to participate in sustainable development initiatives.

The City, headed by its mayor Ronnel C. Rivera, is a highly- urbanized city In the Southernmost Philippines. Though considered to be one of the most competitive cities in the country, the City holds no exception to societal issues like extreme poverty, high incidence of child delinquency, and underemployment. GenSan also grabbed the record from Tugeguarao of being the hottest city in the Philippines, with heat index ranging from 38-44 degrees Celsius recorded throughout the year, thus making it one of regions most affected by climate change in the country.

The Tuna Capital's fishing industry – highly-dependent on the abundance of resources in the nearby municipal and international waters – have yet to realize the importance of sustainable consumption and production which led to dwindling fish catch in the past few years.

By exposing the youth to these realities, and developing their potential to effectively act upon them, Local Government Units like GenSan aim to unite all sectors of the society through the youth and took a more aggressive and proactive stance towards achieving these 17 Global Goals in the next 13 years which is hoped to bring about the inclusive growth and development we have all been dreaming of.


In recent decades, the world has witnessed the youth's unprecedented participation and engagement in responding to most pressing global issues. Leaders of today's generation, from the local to the international scene, has long since realized the importance of youth's opinion and their key role in crafting and conceptualizing comprehensive programs and policies aimed at addressing challenges like environmental degradation, and extreme poverty, socio-economic inequalities, limited political representation, and uneven educational and job opportunities people from around the globe has since been facing.

This premise has lead the United Nations to encouraging and pushing forward youth's active involvement towards achieving its organization's 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development. Adopted in 2015 – and with the aim of integrating the three dimensions of Sustainable Development: social, economic and environmental – the 2030 Agenda's 17 goals and the 169 targets between them are interconnected,


The youth's significant role in engaging people at the grassroots and having served as active drivers of change in the communities they are in makes this potential very vital in communicating these goals to a wider society.

Two years after the initiation of Sustainable Development Goals, young people and youth-led and youth-serving organizations in the Philippines responded positively to the challenge of translating these goals into local and national policies and ensuring their proper implementation, monitoring and evaluation, and holding public offices accountable.







200 local youth leaders from across the country shall undergo leadership training and policy formulation simulation wherein they shall be given the venue to tackle issues they and their respective communities face and intellectualize policies aimed at addressing these issues.

Specifically, 2017 NYLC alms to achieve the following objectives:

- Improve local youth leaders' understanding of Sustainable Development Goals;
- > Build the capacity of the delegates in conceptualizing policies gearing towards the realizations of the SDG's;
- Engage youth leaders in designing programs tallored- fit to the needs of their respective communities;
- Encourage the delegales to bring the SDC campaign to the grassroots; and
- Foster ties and cooperation in tuture sustainable development initiatives targeted at the youth.






Aligned with the objectives of this program, the following major program components are proposed:

- **A. Boot Camps** The delegates will undergo boot camps, which will be done by cluster. They will have sessions and activities related to their respective elements, with the following objectives:
  - **i. Gain Understanding of the SDGS** Participants will be able to understand the vital role of the youth in achieving the SDGs, and the context of the challenges faced by their respective communities and the country to achieve such goals; and
  - **II. Improve Design Thinking** Through workshops on policy- making, delegates will obtain the necessary skills and knowledge to provide practical and feasible solutions to the challenges in their respective communities.
- **B. Young Leaders' Congress** Each cluster shall draft 1 ordinance and 2 resolutions related to their respective elements, and they must chose 3 representatives from among themselves who will propose it during the congress.

All 15 representatives shall then choose from among themselves the presiding officer of the session and parliamentary rules and procedures will be observed all throughout the session. There shall also be side events for non-representing delegates. This shall ensure that the following objectives are met:


**I. Getting briefed, hearing arguments, and coming to decisions** – The congress puts the delegates in their elected local officials' shoes by simulating process they go through in making policy decisions.

II. Encourage innovative solutions to address existing challenges - The youth delegates will be able to work with each other to design solutions to societal issues.
